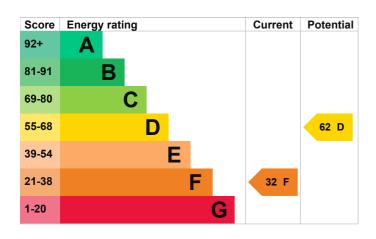

How this affects your energy bills

An average household would need to spend £4,943 per year on heating, hot water and lighting in this property. These costs usually make up the majority of your energy bills.
